Council enthusiastically supported an offer from acclaimed Indigenous sculptor, Stewart Steinhauer, to loan the municipality a large, marble sculpture called "Four Directions Bear Family." Steinhauer, from Saddle Lake, Alberta, spends winters in Peachland. Other examples of Steinhauer's work can be seen at Kelowna General Hospital, Lake Country Municipal Hall, Summerland Museum and Kelowna Friendship Centre. The artist offers to cover insurance and transportation costs, and the District would cover the installation costs. Peachland would have the right of first refusal to purchase the piece as a permanent installation at a future date. The District is investigating appropriate locations to showcase the sculpture.

Curbside Collection of Glass & Flexible Plastic Coming May 2026

Starting May 2026, Central Okanagan residents with curbside collection will be able to recycle non-refundable glass bottles and jars and flexible plastics, such as chip bags, crinkly wrappers, zipper-lock pouches and bubble wrap. To support curbside recycling of these materials, households will receive two new recycling boxes prior to May 2026. The gray box will be for non-refundable glass bottles and jars and the pink box is for flexible plastics.

The expansion of services is part of the region's transition to Recycle BC managing curbside recycling which was presented to the Regional Board on September 4, 2025. RDCO staff collaborated with Recycle BC to enhance service levels for residents which will also include avoiding financial penalties for contamination, expanding materials collected at curbside, maintaining bi-weekly pickup and existing cart programs while controlling costs.

Recycle BC works with local government and private partners to collect residential paper and packaging, including the materials managed in curbside collection programs and the materials managed at depots, such as foam packaging.

Residents who receive curbside service for flexible plastics and non-refundable glass bottles and jars will still need to take foam packaging to a local depot for recycling.

BACK TO SCHOOL



With school back in session, motorists should keep these road safety tips in mind:

- Peachland BGCO Childcare Centre Construction is underway near the Peachland Elementary School. Please use the designated crosswalks and be aware of construction distractions and equipment.
- Build in time to prevent rushing. Your to-do list is long and there's never enough time in your day. That's why we recommend you anticipate school zone congestion and give yourself extra time to get through it safely.
- Expect the unexpected. Look out for safety risks such as kids darting from cars, kids who are on wheels, and other pedestrians.
- Follow school zone rules. Respect your school's drop off and pick up rules. Be mindful of traffic rules such as driving the speed limit, stopping at crosswalks and avoiding distracted driving.
- Reduce congestion. Maybe leave the car at home (or park blocks away) and then walk or cycle with
- Focus on what you can control. No matter what's going on around you, be patient and courteous.
- Obey crossing guards and watch for buses. Always come to a complete stop when an adult crossing guard or student patroller signals you to do so. Be extra cautious around school buses and never pass a bus when its red lights are flashing and the stop arm is extended.

Council Highlights

August 26, 2025 COUNCIL MEETING

Fees and Charges Bylaw

Council adopted a Development Application and Licence Fees Bylaw Amendment to better reflect current costs of providing municipal services, the staff time required to facilitate reviews and approvals, and to ensure fee alignment with regional municipalities. Council first considered the Amendment on July 8 when they requested an adjustment to the recommended Bed and Breakfast license fee. The new fees and charges take effect on September 25, 2025.

4758 Princeton Avenue Development

Council adopted Zoning and Official Community Plan amendment bylaws for 4758 Princeton Avenue, rezoning the property to Multi-Unit Residential – Low Density and Cluster (RM3) to allow for an improved access and moderate expansion of the townhouse proposal associated with a previous application on the adjacent property below Turner Park. All zoning conditions have been met, including approval from the Ministry of Transportation and Transit.

Thorne Road Maintenance

Council agreed to double the maintenance of Thorne Road after a request from residents to have it paved. The road serves nine residences and a parcel of farmland which lies outside of District boundaries. The District will conduct grading monthly, including dust control, and will increase monitoring of the condition of the road, reporting back to Council every 4 meetings with an update on road conditions.

September 9, 2025 COUNCIL MEETING

RCMP Update

Staff Sergeant Brendan Dolan presented an update on policing, indicating crime statistics in Peachland are good. A large uptick in traffic incidents can be attributed to the RCMP's commitment to Peachland Council last year to increase enforcement of speeding. He said the detachment's Crime Reduction Unit will investigate an increase in break and enters (from 0 to 4 incidents). S Sgt Dolan gave details about a drug bust of a property in Peachland in July which seized large amounts of a variety of illegal drugs, multiple firearms, body armour and stolen property. He said he believes the individuals have left Peachland. He also provided information for Council about bringing enforcement of electric motorcycles to Peachland, where they have been seen speeding and stunting on local roads. Electric motorcycles are not allowed on public roads, they cannot be insured and are for off-road use only.
